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a newbery honor book and a modern classic of young adult fantasy the blue sword introduces the desert kingdom of damar where magic weaves through the blood and weaves together destinies new york times bestselling and award winning author robin mckinley sets the standard for epic fantasy and compelling complex heroines fans of sarah j maas leigh bardugo and rae carson will delight in discovering the rich world of damar harry crewe is a homelander orphan girl come to live in damar from over the seas she is drawn to the bleak landscape so unlike the green hills of her homeland she wishes she might cross

the sands and climb the dark mountains where no homelander has ever set foot where the last of the old damarians the free hillfolk live corlath is the golden eyed king of the free hillfolk son of the sons of the legendary lady aerin when he arrives in harry s town to ally with the homelanders against a common enemy he never expects to set harry s destiny in motion she will ride into battle as a king s rider bearing the blue sword the great mythical treasure which no one has wielded since lady aerin herself legends and myths no matter how epic no matter how magical all begin somewhere

harry bored with her sheltered life in the remote orange growing colony of daria discovers magic in herself when she is kidnapped by a native king with mysterious powers

although readers and filmgoers are strongly familiar with disney s sanitized child centric fairy tales they are quick to catch on to reworkings of classic tales into a contemporary context the rise is such retellings seems to indicate that readers are hungry for a new narrative one that hearkens back to the old yet moves the storyline forward to reflect conditions of the modern world no mere escapist fantasies the reimagined fairy tales of the late 20th and early 21st centuries reflect social political and cultural truths sixteen essays consider fairy tales recreated through short stories novels poetry and the graphic novel from both best selling and lesser known writers applying a variety of perspectives including postmodernism psychoanalysis marxism feminism queer theory and gender studies along with the classic fairy tales fiction from writers such as neil gaiman stardust and gregory macquire wicked is covered

designed to aid adults parents teachers librarians in selecting from the best of recent children s literature this guide provides 1 400 reviews of books published between 1979 and 1984 this volume carries on the tradition established by zena sutherland s two earlier collections covering the periods from 1966 to 1972 and 1973 to 1978 her 1973 edition of the best in children s books was cited by the american school board journal as one of the outstanding books of the year in education

the book focuses on individuals writing in the 90s but also includes 12 classic authors e g mark twain louisa may alcott j r r tolkien who are still widely read by teens it also covers some authors known primarily for adult literature e g stephen king and some who write mainly for middle readers but are also popular among young adults e g betsy byars an affordable alternative to multivolume publications this book makes a great collection development tool and resource for author studies it will also help readers find other books by and about their favorite writers

contains entries for over 1 300 books aimed at young adult readers titles have been selected on the basis of their currency appeal to readers and literary merit

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with 140 fewer pages than the fourth edition the fifth obviously has been tightened it's partly in the format with narrower margins and less white space otherwise some text has been rephrased or rearranged and topics for example adolescent psychology given shorter shrift coverage of holocaust literature has been expanded and discussion of problem novels improved sports books have been dumped in with humor movies and other stuff including humorous poetry which it seems the authors feel is the only kind teens read for pleasure other types of poetry as well as short stories and drama are relegated to the english classroom coverage of which has been enlarged the chapter on sf and fantasy is good on historical aspects but weak on today's writers a short list of internet listerves and sites has been incorporated as part of using ya literature in the library once again updating of appendixes seems spotty nevertheless this is useful as a resource for youth librarians and a tool for teaching ya literature sally estes

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
